Klamath County Planning

A hearing was held on this matter on November 15, 1984, pursuant to notice given in conformity with Ordinance No. 45.2, Klamath County, before the Klamath County Hearings Officer, Jim Spindor. The applicant was present. The Klamath County Planning Department was represented by Jonathan Chudnoff. Hearings Reporter was Judy Whitaker.

Evidence was presented on behalf of the Department and on behalf of the applicant. There were no adjacent property owners present.

The hearing was then closed, and based upon the evidence submitted at the hearing, the Hearings Officer made the following Conclusions of Law:

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW:

- 1. The proposed use is conditionally permitted in the zone within which it is proposed to be located.
- 2. The location, size, design, and operating characteristics of the proposed use are in conformance with the Klamath County Comprehensive Plan.
- 3. The location, size, design, and operating characteristics of the proposed use will be compatible with and will not have a significant adverse effect on the appropriate development and use of the abutting property and the surrounding neighborhood.
- 4. The granting of this conditional use permit is consistent with the goals of the L.C.D.C.

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- This conditional use permit is granted subject to the following conditions:
- 3 The applicant shall obtain all necessary state and federal permits and shall follow all conditions which are a part of said permit. The applicant shall provide the Klamath County Planning Department with copies of all state and federal permits b.
- The diversion pipeline and penstock shall be buried to minimize visual and physical effects on the area.
- c. The power line from the project shall be buried and, to the extent feasible, shall follow the existing road rights of way.
- d. Existing roads shall be used to reach the site, and no new roads shall be constructed because of the applicant's use. FINDINGS OF FACT:

The requested use has been granted with conditions based on the following findings of fact:

19 1. This application is for a conditional use permit for a power generating plant in the forestry zone. The project 20 would be on Weyerhaeuser Company land in the canyon of the north 21 fork of the Sprague River about 11 miles northeast of Bly. The 22 project will consist of a rock and concrete diversion structure built into the river, a 4,800-foot buried pipeline, 256-foot buried penstock, a powerhouse on the riverbank, and a buried electrical line connecting with an existing Pacific Power and Light powerline on Campbell Road. All water used will be returned to the river at the powerhouse. The project is more C.U.P. 51-84

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fully described in Exhibits C, D, H, and I, which are a part of the record.

- 2. The rated power capacity of the project would be 600 kilowatts, and the project will operate unattended, with computer-operated automatic controls. Once the equipment is installed and properly running, visits to the site will be required less than once a month. The electricity will be purchased by Pacific Power and Light.
- 3. The project is located in a steep, rocky canyon with Class VII soils. There is no agricultural use of the area. The Obenchain Ranch uses water from the north fork, but this water source is below the project in question. Water flows below the project would not be reduced.
- 4. The project will be constructed in the river canyon and will require little tree cutting. Existing roads will be used to reach the site, and no new roads will be needed for construction. The power line from the site will be buried, and for the most part would follow established roads, avoiding the need for a cut-over power line corridor. Nearly all of the land in the project boundary would remain undisturbed, continuing in its present forest use.
- 5. The north fork is a Class I stream with significant trout habitat. The project would not impede stream flow, and the applicant has reached an agreement with the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife on habitat protection and minimum stream flow (see Exhibit J). The river is under consideration for a scenic designation by the Fremont National Forest. Except for the powerhouse, all parts of this project would be under

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water or under ground. The scenic effects would be very small, except during the months of construction.

- The only pollution from this project would be temporary siltation and erosion during construction. Once operating, the project would cause no air, water, or land pollution.
- 7. The area has a high fire hazard rating, but the proposed project does not increase the fire danger.
- 9 The north fork supports a native trout population and is used for fishing. The applicant has reached an agreement with the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife which would protect the fish by installing a screen over the diversion structure and maintaining a minimum flow in the river. By use of a diversion rather than a dam, the river will be kept open.
- 9. The project is estimated to cost \$2.8 million, much of which will be spent locally for labor and materials. Ongoing economic benefits will be provided through the sale of low-cost power to Pacific Power and Light.
- 10. Access to the site is over Weyerhaeuser and Forest Service logging roads; no additional road construction would be required by the project. Once operating, the project would require only sporadic traffic.
- The only objection raised was set forth in Exhibit K; however, the concerns expressed in this letter by Mr. Cook of the Parks & Recreation Division of the Oregon State Department of Transportation have been satisfied, as can been seen by Exhibit Q.

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The Hearings Officer, based on the foregoing Findings of Fact, accordingly orders as follows: That real property described as 3 "being generally located on the North Fork of Sprague River, about 9 miles northeast of Bly, and more particularly described as being 5 located in the SE% NW% and the N% SW% of 6 Section 29, N_2^2 SE% and SW% SE% of Section 30, Township 35, Range 15," 7 is hereby conditionally granted a conditional use permit in 8 accordance with the terms of the Klamath County Zoning Ordinance No. 45.2, and, henceforth, will be allowed to establish 10 a power generating plant in the forestry zone. 11 Entered at Klamath Falls, Oregon, this 9^{10} day of 12 January, 1985. 13 KLAMATH COUNTY HEARINGS DIVISION 14 15 16 Jim Spindor, Hearings Officer 17 18 19 20 21 22 23 24 25 RETURN: Commissioners Journal 26 27 28 C.U R. 51-84 Page 6
