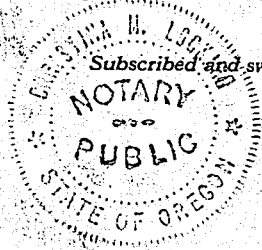
* Federal law requires that not less than \$100 worth of labor must be performed or improvements made on a mining claim annually to hold the possessory right to the claim. The period within which the work is required to be done commences at 12:00 o'clock Meridian on the first day of September succeeding the date of location of the claim. The applicable state law should be examined to determine all requirements for an Affidavit of Proof of Labor or Improvements and the time allowed for filing affidavits since requirements and time vary from state to state.

IMPORTANT NOTICE: A mining claim is deemed abandoned under 43 U.S. Code Sec. 1744 unless a copy of the official record of an affidavit of assessment work performed, a notice of intention to hold a mining claim, or a detailed report under 30 U.S. Code Sec. 28-1 is also filed annually for recordation with the state office of the Bureau of Land Management in the state where the claim is situated on or before December 30th of each year following the calendar year in which the claim was located. Because BLM recordation regulations change periodically, you should obtain recordation regulations from your local BLM office to determine effective requirements for mining claims. Additional regulations of the BLM and Forest Service may apply to the conducting of mining operations on national forest and BLM administered lands.

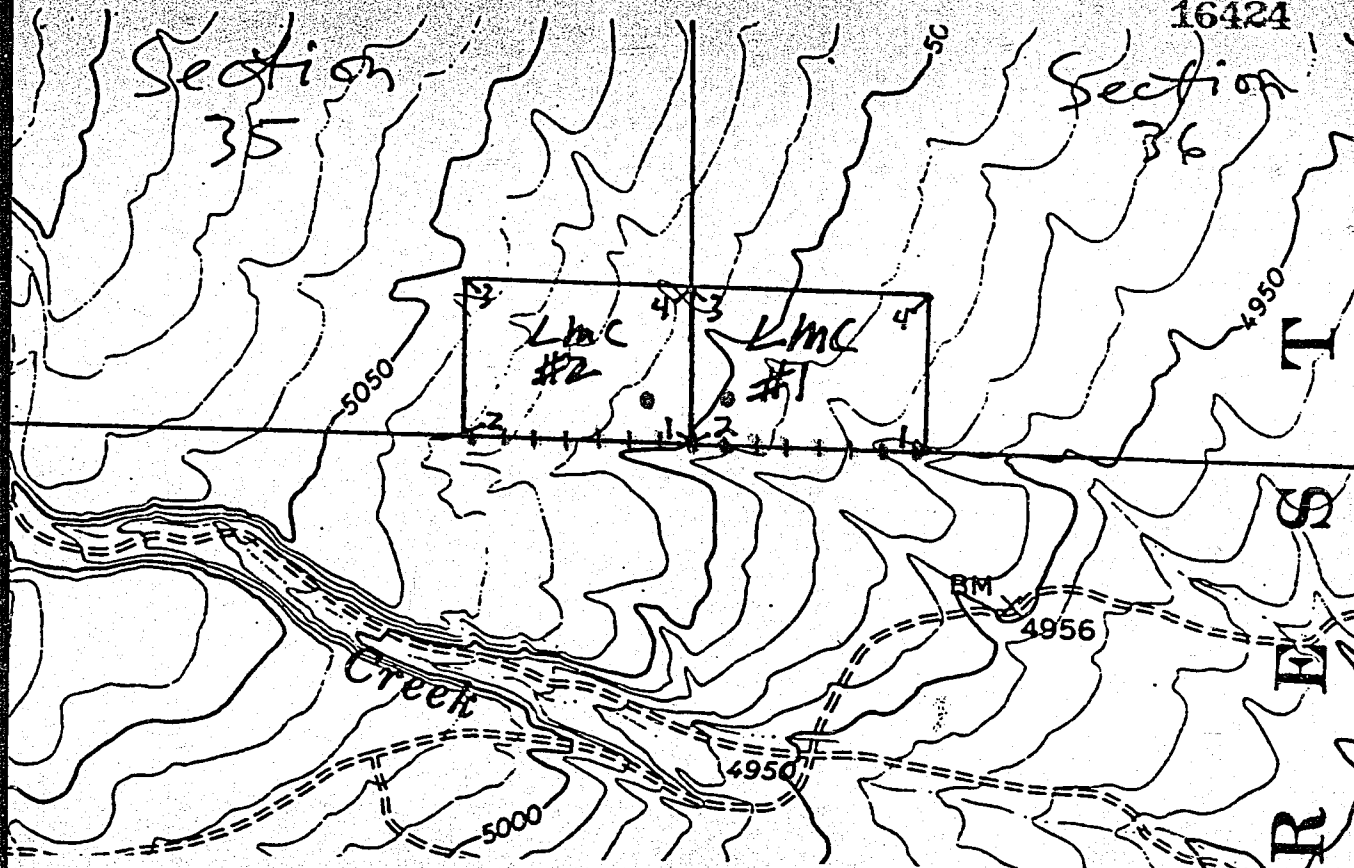

A. Nature, extent, and cost of the survey.

The nature of the geophysical survey was an examination of the relative isotopic readings of radioactive AU. The extent of the work involved an examination of the readings of the isotope machine along the Southern border of the claims on a West to East basis. The readings were taken about every 160 feet from the West end of the claims to the East end of the claims. The cost of the survey greatly exceeded \$200.00.

B. Location of the work performed.

The locations where the readings were taken are depicted on the map above. They can be seen in relation to both the claim borders and the location monuments.

C. Basic findings of the survey.

The findings of the survey are listed below in the West to East sequence. The main dial basis was set at 500 and the gross sensitivity meter was set at 5. These readings show relative indications of isotopic AU that are present and are a positive indication of mineralization.
