I, OSCAR KITTREDGE, being first duly sworn, depose and say:
That I am the son of William Kittredge and Maude A. Kittredge, who settled
in the Klamath Marsh area in 1912, and I was about the age. of 12 years
at the time.

When we came to Klamath Marsh we rented the ranch of William Ball, who was a Klamath Indian and my father immediately entered upon expanding the then existing irrigation of the lands in the general area of the Klamath Marsh. At the time we came there, there was an open slough, called Cholo Slough which was named for an Indian by the name of Cholo.

Jameson Brothers built a sod dam prior to the time we moved there for the purpose of drying the hay land rented from the Indian's allotment and grazed cattle and raised hay in that general area. Father then went to renting additional land and started purchasing land in the Klamath Marsh area from individual Indians and through the Indian Service, and immediately expanded the irrigation operations which were already in existence, and perfected the drainage.

In the year 1917 my father and William Lane from Silver Lake, Oregon, constructed a diversion at Rock Island below the Cholo Slough which has been maintained there ever since. This diversion was for the purpose of irrigating the lands by placing a headgate in this diversion. Then when it came time for haying, we opened the headgate so as it would be removed, and the water permitted to flow into the Three Creeks country and irrigate that area, after which it would be discharged back into the swamp and downstream towards the Military Crossing.

The Big Wire Dam was built in the year 1918 for the purpose of diverting the water to the Big Wire field and the Little Wire field and the Timothy field. After the water had been diverted into these

fields from the several dams, there were smaller ditches and dykes built to spread the water over the land, which then drained back into the and Cholo Slough Williamson River and ran on down into the swamp.

The locations of the various dams heretofore referred to are as follows and have been furnished by the Klamath County Watermaster:

- The Cholo (Chalah), Slough; within the SW $\frac{1}{2}$ SE $\frac{1}{2}$, Section 18, Township 30 South, Range 10 East of the Willamette Meridian (1060' N and 1210' E from the S $\frac{1}{2}$ corner, Section 18).
- The Rock Island Diversion; NE4NW4, Section 24, Township 30 South, Range 9 East of the Willamette Meridian (180' S and 130' W from the N1/4 corner, Section 24).
- Big Wire Dam Diversion; within the NW4NW4, Section 16, Township 30 South, Range 10 East of the Willamette Meridian (550' S and 820' E from the NW corner, Section 16).
